Jessica Mills and Gabi Bresett, who have both been residents of the Fowlerville area for the last 30 years, have partnered to organize and oversee the weekly event.


"We feel that bringing a market to town is going to positively impact the community and are looking forward to all of the

Webberville soldier returns home nearly 83 years after his death in World War II By Steve Horton

A Webberville soldier has returned home nearly 83 years after his death at the start of World War II.

James W. Swartz, who grew up in the community, died on Sept. 23, 1942, at age 21 in a Japanese prisoner-of-war camp in the Philippines.

For much of that time, his remains were classified as nonrecoverable. But thanks to the diligent efforts of the U.S. Army and DNA samples from his closest living descendant, Lori Byrnes, a great niece who lives in Fowlerville, he was identified and brought back to Michigan for burial.

Byrnes noted that four generations of James Swartz's nieces and nephews were gathering this Saturday, May 3, 2025 to celebrate his life and finally bring him home. The funeral, with full military honors, was taking place at Summit Cemetery in Williamston. He was being buried next to his parents.

"We hope Jim will find peace and love in his final resting place," Byrnes added.

Jim was born May 18, 1921, in Grand Rapids, Michigan. His parents were Marie Scheltema (Swartz) Stringham and Charles Stringham. He had two sisters Elouise (Swartz) Meyer and Edna Stringham and one brother Chuck Stringham.

Elouise was Lori's grandmother.

Lori put together an obituary for the Army, using information from letters Jim had written his sister while in the service and other family artifacts as well as the oral history that had been handed down over the years.

"I didn't have much to go on," she added.

In the obituary, it was noted that Jim attended school in Webberville and graduated in the Class of 1939. He enjoyed sports, especially basketball and his mother's home cooking.

In August of 1939, Jim enlisted in the Air Corp Division of the Army, and attended training at Selfridge Field and at the Curtiss Wright Aromatic University in Chicago.

Jim served in the 17th Pursuit Squadron as a Staff Sergeant, at Nichols Field in the Philippines for two years. After Pearl Harbor was bombed, the U.S. entered World War II on December 8, 1941. The very next day the Japanese began devastating air raids in the Philippines which continued until April 1942, when the sick and starving US forces surrendered.

Jim was one of the 10,000 American prisoners that were forced on the 65-mile "Bataan Death March" into captivity. He died tragically at the age of 21 years, in the Cabanatuan POW Camp, Sept. 23, 1942, of malaria, dysentery and malnutrition.

After the war, U.S. forces attempted to recover remains of U.S. soldiers, but due to lack of physical evidence Jim's remains were classified nonrecoverable. In 2017, Jim's Gr. Niece, Lori Byrnes of Fowlerville, was asked to submit DNA samples. In 2019, as part of the Cabanatuan Project, the unknowns were exhumed and sent to the lab for analysis. Sgt James W. Swartz was ultimately identified in August 2024.

"The descendants of James W. Swartz are honored to memorialize a wonderful young man that meant so much to his family and friends, 83 years after his passing," said Byrnes.

"My great grandma lived to be 97 years old and she never stopped missing her son," Byrnes noted. "To think he had such a brutal ending haunted her. It changed our whole family and is so sad. Through reading the letters he wrote my grandmother I was able to glean a little bit about Jim. I wish

I would have gotten to know him. It is a great thing the Army did to finally bring him home – it matters."

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Michigan DNR Fishing Tips--

Tips for handling catch-andrelease fish & taking photos

Are you an avid catch-and-release angler? Do you like to take photos of the fish you catch, prior to returning them to the water? Do you know the safest way to take these photos so you ensure the fish can live to be caught another day?

- 1. Wet your hands before you handle the fish that way you won't remove any of the protective mucus (a.k.a. slime) that coats the fish's body.
- 2. Remember a fish cannot breathe out of water, so they will become uncomfortable rather quickly. Keep the fish in the water until your camera is ready to take the
- 3. Take the photo with the fish close to the water, that way if it squirms out of your hands it will land in the water — not on a hard surface.
- 4. While holding a fish, do not pinch or squeeze it, and do not stick your fingers in its gills.
- 5. Be mindful of the different kinds of fish that have teeth or spines that could stick you.

Livingston County Comments

This week at the April 24th board meeting, we were happy to present certificates to two who have given many years of service to the people of Livingston County. Sue Bostwick was Equalization Director for many years and served in the county in different capacities for 25 years. Bob Bezotte, likewise, has served as Deputy, County Sheriff, County Commissioner, and 47th District State of Michigan Representative. Special thanks to both for their years of honorable service.

We adopted the updated 2025-2029 Livingston County Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). The goal of this plan is to coordinate emergency response efforts to save lives, reduce injuries and preserve property. It sets forth general concepts, policies, tasks and guidelines for all hazards. This (EOP) has been reviewed and signed by the subject matter experts who would handle emergency and disaster response. Having this plan in place makes us eligible for state/federal funding or reimbursement of costs and will be valid for four years.

We authorized the addition of four full-time EMT positions. EMS continues to struggle to meet the increasing demand for its service. Call volume for 2025 has increased by 10% over 2024 which was already a record year. We expect the need for services to continue to grow. The most cost-effective way to solve this problem is the addition of a Basic Life Support (BLS) unit to help with the non-emergency transports like from hospital back to a care facility. It will also help with summer vacations without requiring expensive overtime hours. People hired in these entry-level positions must become certified paramedics within 30 months allowing them to move on to an Advanced Life Support unit.

We also approved the 2025 Plan of Organization for the Health Department. This is in preparation for our department's scheduled state accreditation review the week of July 7, 2025. Typically, these reviews happen every three years, but due to the pandemic, the accreditation cycle was paused. (Our last accreditation was in 2017.) Updating our present plan is a minimum requirement for approval. For a little background, the Michigan Local Public Health Accreditation Program was established in 1998 to assess and improve the performance of Michigan's local public health departments.

Keefe Commissary Network has been a valuable partner with our county jail for the past five years, providing the jail with inmate banking, commissary, and vending services. Our approval of this contract will enable the jail to continue providing these services to the inmates, enhancing their experience and our operations and improving the jail's overall conditions. Last year the vending machines generated a profit of \$17,108.62 which is dedicated to these improvements.

Michigan's summer is ripe with produce festivals

As Michigan's produce season begins, communities across the state are marking the start of summer with festivals rooted in local flavor.

Festivals centered around products and crops like maple syrup, peaches, cherries and apples are planned through early fall.

The festivals contribute to growth in agrotourism according to Nick Nerbonne, the media and digital director at Pure Michigan, the state's travel promotion agency. "There's no question that these types of festivals are big drivers of tourism in local communities," Nerbonne said.

"So, these festivals do drive local economic growth for these communities, bringing in visitors that may not have visited otherwise," he said.

Nerbonne said the festivals provide a unique opportunity for people to experience Michigan's agricultural heritage firsthand.

"We love to celebrate our agricultural heritage in Michigan, and now our farmers and communities are figuring out new ways to get visitors involved in agricultural destinations," he said.

One example is the Shepherd Maple Syrup Festival, held this year from April 24-27. The festival has been a staple of the community since 1958.

"It started with some folks tapping trees. They produced some syrup and they had a small community breakfast," said Dawn Vanneste, the public relations and marketing coordinator for the festival.

The festival is a nonprofit event that is organized and hosted by volunteers. In 2024, approximately 800 volunteers helped manage the festival. According to the 2023 census, Shepherd, in Isabella County, has a population of 1,503.

The festival offers activities, including all-you-can-eat pancake and sausage meals, a 5K race, helicopter rides, cornhole tournaments and a pancake-eating contest.

All funds from the festival are reinvested into the Shepherd community and have provided money for local parks, sporting organizations and scholarships.

"It's nice because it comes full circle – all these generations of families are out there collecting sap in late winter to early spring and making the syrup all the way up to the festival, and it just all ends up coming back to the community," Vanneste said.

Later in the summer, celebrations such as the Romeo Peach Festival in Macomb County, which runs from Aug. 29 to Sept. 2, will continue the seasonal celebrations of Michigan's bounty.

"I would just like the people to come out and see our festival," said Rob Kreger, the festival's president.

"It's 94 years old – we're the second-oldest festival in the state. It's a really good hometown festival. There's a little something for everybody," he said.

The Romeo Peach Festival features activities such as a carnival, food truck pavilion, live entertainment, craft show, classic car show and a beer tent.

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Returning to Sanibel Island this past winter

My husband Ed and I have not been to Sanibel since 2019 due to the hurricanes that hit the island. However, this past winter we returned to enjoy the warm weather and scenic

Sanibel has been recovering from Ian which struck it in 2022. Those recovery efforts were hampered by two more hurricanes in 2024—Milton and Helene—that slowed down the effort to finish all the repairs that needed to be done after the earlier storm.

Sanibel is a city on Sanibel Island and located in southwest Florida. You may recall that I previously wrote an article on

the place in the newspaper. It is known for its beaches filled with shells washed up from the Gulf.

While the island is still in a state of recovery and rebuilding after Hurricane Ian, much progress has been made. The causeway, including the bridge to Sanibel, is open to traffic but construction and restoration are continuing. Our understanding is that by May much of the parking to the beaches by the causeway should be open with new plants and restrooms.

Our favorite restaurants were open, including Over Easy Cafe, Traders, Doc Fords, The Lighthouse Cafe, Jerrys and Timbers. However, Bailey's General Store—a long standing landmark on the island—has been undergoing demolition and rebuilding after being damaged by Hurricane Ian. The store has been operating at a temporary location, "A Bit of Bailey's," is on Rabbit Road while the main store is being rebuilt. The new store should be open by 2026.

We stayed at Loggerhead Cay Condos as Ocean Reach was still closed, although it's now open. Most lodging accommodations are back online. All in all, the island is slowly returning to its former pre-storm status, with natural habitat, replanted palm trees and businesses returning to

Michigan House Report

This week the House passed a legislative plan cracking down on sanctuary cities harboring illegal immigrants in Michigan. Sanctuary cities are municipalities that have passed policies instructing their local police departments not to cooperate with federal law enforcement in carrying out federal immigration law. Their open defiance of federal law violates the Constitution, undermines the brave men and women serving in law enforcement, and endangers our families by inviting dangerous criminals into Michigan.

The plan, sponsored by myself and other House Republicans, is a five-bill package that would outright prohibit sanctuary cities in Michigan, withhold all statutory revenue sharing from sanctuary cities, and prohibit illegal immigrants from receiving taxpayer-funded assistance from programs like welfare or housing assistance. These are commonsense policies that will keep Michigan from being a destination spot for illegal immigrants that have illegally invaded our country. It will also put an end to the insane and unconstitutional practices of sanctuary cities.

Last week, we saw in my own hometown of Howell the good that results from the exact opposite of sanctuary cities: when local law enforcement cooperates with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). The Livingston County Sheriff's Department arrested two suspected sexual predators accused of sending explicit messages to individuals they believed were minors. The two suspects are believed to be illegal immigrants and were handed over to ICE.

These arrests highlight the incredible work of our law enforcement and also emphasize the alarming consequences of the Biden administration's outrageous and unacceptable open-border policies. It is no exaggeration to call what happened under the previous presidential administration an invasion of our country. Last week's events show that this invasion gives even small communities as far from our border as those in mid-Michigan cause for concern.

The Democrats who advocated for our open border and continue to this day to advocate for sanctuary cities have to answer for why these two dangerous, predatory criminals were ever allowed to live next to our families and be near our children. As recently as last year, Governor Gretchen Whitmer was using taxpayer dollars to invite illegal immigrants to relocate themselves to Michigan, into our neighborhoods. Now, we see in my own hometown evidence of what Republicans have been saying for years and common sense should have told the Democrats all along: inviting in individuals who willfully commit criminal acts and show no accountability to our federal law makes our communities, our families, and our children less safe.

We are fortunate that the people who not only abdicated in the face of, but even encouraged, the illegal invasion of our country are

no longer in charge of enforcing our laws and protecting our homeland security. House Republicans in Michigan are doing our part to empower law enforcement and put an end to the radical left's continued efforts to incentivize illegal immigration.

My legislation that would rename the bridge on South Grand Avenue over Highway I-96 in Fowlerville to the "LCpl Michael W. Hanks Memorial Bridge" was passed out of committee yesterday and will soon receive a vote on the House floor. This bill offers an excellent opportunity to commemorate one of Livingston County's most exemplary heroes who was born in Howell and buried in Fowlerville.

Lance Corporal Hanks was killed in action on November 17th, 2004 while charging into a heavily-fortified enemy position during combat in the Anbar province, Iraq. He was posthumously awarded the Silver Star Medal for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action, after on multiple occasions disregarding his own personal safety and saving fellow Marines while eliminating attacking insurgents.

Can Michigan protect nearly a third of its lands & waters by 2030?

The Department of Natural Resources is in the final stages of completing a "Pathways to Michigan the Beautiful" report to map out how to protect about a third of the state's lands and waters in the next five years.

The initiative is modeled after the Biden administration's 2021 "America the Beautiful" initiative – also dubbed "30 x 30" – that called for locally led, voluntary conservation efforts to conserve 30% of U.S. lands and waters by 2030.

"We've taken 'America the Beautiful' and dropped it down to our state," said Scott Whitcomb, the director of the Office of Public Lands at the DNR.

Other partners involved are the Nature Conservancy, University of Michigan's Water Center, Ducks Unlimited and tribes

Whitcomb said Michigan's approach is a little different than other states' methods.

"We're trying to reflect Michigan values. We have a lot of public lands that would be at the core of this," he said.

"But then we're also looking at some of those practices on lands that maybe other states aren't looking at, and that's our working lands that are under some sort of conservation management", he said.

Whitcomb said they got input from various stakeholders, including the Michigan Farm Bureau, forest products industry and large landowners.

"Having the working lands at the table – and not adversarial to the department – is going to result in a better environment for everybody," he said.

That could include private lands, such as those enrolled in the DNR's Commercial Forest Program or the federal Conservation Reserve Program, which provide tax or other financial incentives to encourage sustainable management practices.

"We feel there's a place to count those," he said. "They may not be durable conservation measures that are permanent, but they are contributing to the quality of life and the quality of those lands."

But mapping conservation measures on private lands that are administered through different programs is challenging, Whitcomb said.

"One of the things that everyone gets hung up on is, what are the numbers?" he said. "We're in the process of crunching those numbers."

Exactly how much land is already conserved depends on whom you ask.

An online map by Ducks Unlimited estimates that nearly 20% of land is currently protected.

The DNR's estimate is higher at about 24% of land and 19% of water protected.

"The DNR has taken a broader view," Whitcomb said. "We don't necessarily want to say it's got to be in state government ownership or federal ownership."

Protecting land is also a pillar of the MI Healthy Climate Plan, which calls for reducing greenhouse gas emissions and achieving 100% carbon-free clean energy by 2050. Native vegetation can naturally sequester carbon, Whitcomb said.

It also benefits people, he added.

"There are benefits for equitable access to public spaces. There's benefit to our economy. It's beneficial to our quality of life," he said.

Besides the pathways report, another product available to the public will be a new online map viewer that shows protected lands, Whitcomb said. Last year Sen. Sue Shink, D-Northfield Township, introduced a "Michigan the Beautiful" bill to require the DNR to coordinate state efforts to create regional plans to protect 30% of lands and waters by 2030.

The bill was co-sponsored by Sens. Dayna Polehanki, D-Livonia, and Mary Cavanagh, D-Redford Township, and supported by the DNR but didn't pass.

Whitcomb said, "It would have potentially brought resources, but it would have also lent legislative support that would say publicly, 'yes, we support the work of conservation in our state for all of the benefits that it can provide."

Whitcomb said the DNR is working with the nonprofit Nature Conservancy to complete an initial assessment of protected lands and worked with consultants to conduct polling and outreach for public input.

Patrick Doran, the Nature Conservancy's Midwest division director of strategy, measures and science, said the organization led the analysis of habitat types in the state.

"How much is protected, what areas are underrepresented in current land management protections" for grasslands, wetlands and aquatic systems, Doran said.

Doran said even small projects can be valuable in reaching the 30% goal, but it's important to be thoughtful about where and how conservation actions are implemented.

"All these little actions are stepwise improvements in the health of the system. Whether it's a stream or a forest or a grassland, it can really go a long way," he said.

And while federal funding is important, "it goes much beyond the ability of public funding to support it because the problem is so big."

Doran said it's important that businesses recognize the value of the natural world for their operations.

"For example, maintaining healthy wetlands near your business property might reduce the impacts of storm surges or flooding," he said. "Nature can manage those things many times more effectively and cheaper than some types of infrastructure."

While the DNR and conservancy focused mainly on landbased aspects of Michigan the Beautiful, students at U-M's Water Center, led by director Jennifer Read, studied the coastal and Great Lakes components.

"The goal was to understand what areas of the coast are already under some kind of management or protection," she said, "and then what the options would be to increase that so we reach the 30% goal."

She said they tried to understand options that would work with landowners and other groups, including county and local governments, land conservancies and tribes.

That information would then be provided to the DNR to lay a foundation for its pathways document on how to achieve their goals, she

"So much of our state's identity, who we are as Michiganders, is as much about Michigan – the water, the lands, the birds, the fish, the animals and our interactions with it – as it is about anything else," Read said. "That's who we are, and we want to continue that."



or problems now that our office is permanently closed? What

administration, which is leading to dozens of office closures and a lot of angst across the country.

Led by Elon Musk and the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE), Social Security policy experts believe these deep staff cuts could cause interruptions in monthly benefit payments, an increase in improper payments, delays in the processing of new benefit applications and disability claims, and longer wait times for Social Security help.

There are 73 million Americans who currently receive Social Security benefits, including seniors, children and people with disabilities. Many rely on these benefits for the bulk of their income, so any disruption or errors in payments or other service delays could cause a lot of problems for beneficiaries.

Advocacy groups are urging concerned Americans to contact their members of Congress and demand protections for the program. To find your elected members contact information, go to Congress.gov/members/find-your-member.

With that said, here's how you can best maneuver the SSA as they downsize.

Use SSA.gov

Anxious Aaron

Most Social Security business today can be conducted online. To get started, just go to SSA.gov/onlineservices where you can create a personal online "my Social Security" account so you can view your latest statement and earnings history, apply for retirement, disability, and Medicare benefits, check the status of an application or appeal, request a replacement Social Security card (in most areas), print a benefit verification letter, and much more.

Their website also has a wealth of information and answers to frequently asked questions that you can access at SSA.gov/ faqs.

Phone Assistance

If you can't conduct your Social Security business online or you need some extra help, you can also get phone assistance by calling your nearby field office (see SSA.gov/locator for contact information) or by calling the SSA national number at 800-772-1213 (TTY 800-325-0778) between 8:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. local time, Monday through Friday.

This number has many automated service options you can use without waiting, but if you do need to speak to a representative, wait times are typically shorter early in the morning (between 8 and 10am) or later in the afternoon (between 4 and 7pm). You may also experience shorter wait times later in the week (Wednesday to Friday) and later in the month.

If you need to visit your nearby SSA office, it's best to call and make an appointment first as walk-ins have much longer wait times. To make an appointment call 800-772-1213 or contact your local SSA office.

Be Patient Also remember to practice patience and plan ahead. With all the SSA staff cuts, delays and longer wait time will be inevitable. And if you're planning to start drawing your Social Security benefits in the near future, it's best to apply as early as possible. You can apply for benefits up to four months before you expect to receive them. Applying as early as possible can

help ensure they're available when needed.

Covering FFA Week in February 1986 By Steve Horton

Highlighting the various activities and accomplishments of students at Fowlerville and Webberville schools has been an integral part of the Fowlerville News & Views coverage since our first issues in 1985. We've continued that focus over the past 40 years.

One of the first organizations spotlighted on a regular basis was FFA-which back then was still known as Future Farmers of America. The Fowlerville High School vocational agriculture program at that time was headed by Mike Martindale, while the Webberville program was led by Bill Wheeler. At the time Fowlerville had 45 members, while Webberville counted 109 on its roll.

Fowlerville eventually dropped voc-ag as a curriculum offering (which included ending FFA), but then brought it back

nine years ago as a science elective and as an extracurricular offering. Webberville has maintained this activity through the

In our Feb. 20, 1986 issue, we had a front page photo of local State Rep. Fred Dillingham presenting the Fowlerville FFA Chapter with a legislative proclamation, declaring Feb. 16-22 as 'FFA Week in Fowlerville'. 

U.S. Senate Report

Introduces Bill to Prevent Chinese Vehicles from entering Country

U.S. Senator Elissa Slotkin (D-MI) has introduced her first bill in the U.S. Senate. The Connected Vehicle National Security Review Act is proposed legislation that would formally establish a national security review process for connected vehicles and connected vehicle components manufactured by companies from China or other countries of concern. The legislation would allow the Department of Commerce to limit or ban the introduction of these vehicles or components from U.S. markets if they pose a threat to national security.

"I will lay down on the border to keep Chinese vehicles from entering the U.S. market. This is my first bill I'm introducing in the Senate, and it's for a reason," Slotkin said in a statement.

"Chinese vehicles could collect huge amounts of data on America and Americans, which poses a significant national security threat. Americans' personal data, our infrastructure, Michigan's auto industry and auto jobs are all at stake.

"Chinese vehicles, which are dirt cheap thanks to state subsidies, could collect full motion video of sensitive sites, 3-D mapping, and geolocation of individual drivers – all of which could be sent back to Beijing. Despite the polarization in Washington right now, protecting U.S. citizens should be nonpartisan, and I look forward to working in a bipartisan fashion to pass this legislation into law."

The way vehicles are now loaded with information gathering technology, like cameras and other sensors, poses a unique threat presented by vehicles and components from China and other nations. Chinese vehicles have a growing market share in Europe and have now set sights on the North American

The Connected Vehicle National Security Review Act would establish in law explicit authorities provided to the U.S. Department of Commerce and other federal agencies under Executive Orders from both the Trump (EO 13873) and Biden (EO 14034) administrations. The bill will provide more explicit statutory authority, strengthening protections against national security risks and ensuring more durable protection against Chinese connected vehicles.

Under the legislation, the Department of Commerce would have the authority to review – and potentially block – any sale, importation, or other transaction that:

- Involves a connected vehicle or component designed. built, or supplied by anyone controlled by or subject to the jurisdiction of a country of concern, including China. This includes connected vehicles and components that are manufactured by Chinese companies operating in third-party countries like Mexico; and
- Presents an undue or unacceptable risk including the risk of sabotage or subversion of other electronic systems, risk to critical infrastructure, or other unacceptable risk to national security or to the safety of Americans.

Earlier this year, the Biden Administration concluded a Department of Commerce-led investigation into the national security risks of connected vehicles from countries of concern, including China. This resulted in a rule banning the import or sale of Chinese or Russian connected vehicles, as well as connected vehicle hardware and software.

The authorities in this bill would go beyond the limits presented by traditional trade-restriction tools, such as tariffs, which may not prevent countries of concern from establishing production in Mexico or other nations for export to the United States. Under the legislation, any connected vehicle or vehicle component built by a company under the ownership, control or jurisdiction of a country of concern is subject to national security review.

Additionally, Slotkin will be introducing a similar bill that applies to the broader Information and Communications Technology and Services (ICTS) supply chain.



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U.S. **Congress** Report

Introduces TRANSPORT Jobs Act to Connect Veterans with Supply Chain Careers

Congressman Tom Barrett (MI-07) and Congresswoman Hillary Scholten (MI-03) introduced the Transitioning Retiring And New Service Members to Port, Ocean, Rail, and Truck (TRANSPORT) Jobs Act. This bipartisan legislation aims to strengthen both veteran employment opportunities and the American supply chain workforce by developing a comprehensive plan to connect veterans with high-demand jobs in the transportation and logistics sector.

Specifically, the bill directs the Secretary of Transportation to work with other federal agencies to develop and release a plan that will identify barriers to hiring veterans in trucking, rail, shipping, and other critical infrastructure roles. It will also require the department to make policy recommendations to eliminate them.

"No one is better trained or more mission-focused than our veterans, yet too many are left struggling to find meaningful employment after leaving the military," said Barrett. "It's time we tear down the roadblocks that stand between those who served and the jobs that need doing in our economy. The TRANSPORT Jobs Act is a critical first step in that process and achieves two goals at once - supporting our veterans and strengthening our nation's supply chain. I'm proud to introduce this bill with Rep. Scholten and look forward to working together to get it across the finish line."
