Fowlerville Community School celebrating Homecoming Week



Book by Deb Klein tells of trip she took, retracing her father Clayton's walks between Paradise & Hell

The late Clayton Klein passed away in 1996, two days short of his 96th birthday. The Fowlerville native had many accomplishments during his long and distinguished life. He founded Klein Fertilizers and operated it for many years, including expanding the company into other communities. He was a canoeist who paddled the wild rivers of northern Canada, an author who wrote books about his outdoors' adventures as well as other topics, a book publisher (founding Wilderness Adventure Books), a book store owner, and a pilot who flew all over Michigan and North America.

He was also a long-distance walker, piling up the miles over the years. It was this pastime that led him to undertaking a special trip at age 86. He called it 'From Paradise to Hell' and it involved starting at the well-known town located in the eastern end of the Upper Peninsula, timing his crossing of

the Mackinac Bridge on Labor Day during the annual bridge walk, and then proceeding south until he reached the hamlet of Hell in southern Livingston County.

Clayton used the walk to raise money for Michigan Palliative Care & Hospice as well as the Family Impact Center in his hometown.

He did additional walks during the next few years, his final one taken in 2009 at age 90. By then he had added another leg to the trek, going from Hell to the Ohio border, meaning that he had traversed the length of Michigan.

Friends and family members would join him on various segments of the walk, with a sizeable group turning out when he neared Fowlerville. He also garnered a good deal of publicity, given his age and the nature of the trip, with features done in local newspapers as well as radio and TV newscasts along the route.

Clayton Klein soon became known as 'The Walking Man.'

His daughter, Deb Klein, had accompanied him on some of those walking segments and also shared other outings, dating back to when she was a young girl.

So in 2019, as a tribute to what her father had done and what he meant to her, she embarked on her own walk, only hers went from 'Hell to Paradise.'

"It was the 10th anniversary from when Dad had made his final trip, so I wanted to retrace his steps," she explained.

Deb then emulated her father in another way, deciding to write a book about the trip, but also detail other activities she'd shared with him over the years.


Her 120-page effort is entitled *In My Father's Footsteps: A Walk from Hell to Paradise* and is now available for sale.

"The walk is only part of what the title means," she pointed out. "I've followed his footsteps in other ways. Both of us enjoyed being outdoors and observing nature. We often went on the rail lines that had been converted into paved trails and I'd bike while he walked. We both liked watching the birds return in the spring and would compare notes. Eating ice cream is another pastime we shared together."

The promo on the back cover of the book gives a flavor of their time together, stating that "His daughter and fellow adventurer Debbie Klein accompanied Clayton on many of his expeditions. Together they canoe above the Arctic Circle and through the Everglades, backpacked the Lake Superior shore, and walked the roads and rustic trails of rural Michigan."

But their time and interests were not centered just on physical activities. "Both of us liked to write, and we both kept journals," she said.

"Dad began keeping a diary at a young age and continued

for most of his life," she said. "With my journaling, I mainly record the joys and blessings of the day."

She did compose a poem which is included in the book.

Her journal writing continued during the walk, only now she made notes of what she'd seen and done. This, in turn, became the raw material for that part of the book.

"I try to take the reader along with me, describing what I'm seeking and the people I met along the way; their generosity and kindness." Deb said.

Despite the passage of time, her father and his annual walk were not forgotten, with a number of people remembering him from when he passed by their town.

"That was especially true in the Houghton Lake area," she said. "The newspaper there—the *Houghton Lake Resoter*—had done articles on him and they did one on me. I was treated like a celebrity."

Unlike Clayton's undertaking, when he only took a couple of breaks from his daily trek between start and finish, Deb spaced out her effort.

"I did my walk over the course of the summer," she said. "The first seven times I only walked a day-at-a-time. When I reached Rosebush, I went three days in a row and then did that later on."

"My brother Darrell accompanied me for much of walk in southern Michigan and then in the Upper Peninsula," she said. "We would leave one of our cars at the start and park the other one at the end of that day's segment and did that until I reached Rosebush."


Deb said she began writing her book after the trip ended and completed it a little over a year ago. She then enlisted the lady who had purchased Wilderness Adventure Books from her father to edit the manuscript and publish the book.

While retracing the trip is the heart of the book, it deals (as mentioned) with other experiences the two of them shared. It also tells about her mother Marjorie, who was a talented artist, along with other family members, and mentions her own adventures including pedaling her bike throughout Michigan and across the United States.

In addition to the text, there are several color photos and route maps.

Deb is retired from Michigan State University, having worked 32 years as a member of the support staff at the Food Service and Human Nutrition department. She graduated from Fowlerville High School in 1972 and now resides in Haslett.

In addition to biking, walking, and otherwise enjoying the great outdoors, she volunteers at the WKAR public radio station during its fundraising drives and belongs to the Haslett Womens Club, a group that supports different charitable causes. She is also a fan of the MSU Spartan football, basketball, and baseball teams.

Is the Declaration of Independence Still Useful?

In many ways, the Declaration of Independence launched our nation. After a considerable period of disagreement and attempted reconciliation with England, the Colonies at last determined that independence was the best option to address the long list of unmitigated grievances stemming from the British crown. The Declaration clearly listed many of these grievances, and it identified the fundamental rationale for independence as well as the doctrine, if you will, of the new

nation.

The Declaration of Independence is a powerful document that maintains a substantial impact on American thought and public policy, yet at the end of the day, it is simply that: a declaration. It does not carry the legal weight of the Constitution or even laws passed by the legislature. Since it is not legally binding, many quickly dismiss the sentiments contained in the Declaration, and others have denigrated the document's importance or relevance. Interestingly, this debate has existed in varying levels of intensity since the formation of the Colonies under one Constitution. The Declaration of Independence may be a 'founding document,' but if it is not a legal one, does it still hold any benefit for us today?

While the Declaration of Independence may not be binding in a court of law, there is more to the *spirit* of America than just legalism, and documents like the Declaration still speak to our national heart. We often look to speeches and writings of our Founders and other great American leaders for inspiration and perspective, so our very 'source document' should not be so easily dismissed. After all, the Declaration enshrines a more balanced thesis built on the deliberations and sincere beliefs of the thirteen Colonies, and fifty-six representatives of the people endorsed the document's assertions through their bold signatures.

The above argument of the Declaration's worth is not meant to muddle the just rule of law nor denigrate the precedence and importance of our Constitution and subsequent laws. However, I believe one of the special qualities that makes America wonderful is the national spirit that is alive throughout and beyond our system of government and laws. While they are not inherently unique to the United States, these 'American principles' are an essential and inescapable part of what defines our country, and they permeate our thinking, decisions, and actions.

The Declaration of Independence presents many of these principles in a clear, concise method with great force, so for this reason alone, I would argue this instrumental document is worth revisiting over and over. The just rule of law is absolutely necessary for stability, success, and true liberty, but it must be accompanied by these intangible American ideals. Without them, America loses its identity and much of its purpose. Principles matter, even on the national level, so yes, the Declaration of Independence is still beneficial for us as individuals and as a nation.

Fowlerville students receive Academic Honors at Ferris State University

Several Fowlerville students were among those who received Academic Honors for the semester that ended in August 2021 at Ferris State University and Kendall College of Art and Design. A total of 1,614 students were named to the list.

To be eligible for Academic Honors, the minimum requirements for full-time students each term are: 3.5 GPA and completion of 12 Ferris credit hours or more of graded course work at the 100 level or higher. The minimum requirements for part-time students each term are: 3.5 GPA with completion of at least 12 accumulated Ferris credit hours of graded course work at the 100 level or higher.

"Once you make these you will never buy dill pickles from the store again," Doris said, adding that "The pickles will keep one year in the refrigerator." The Apple Dessert was a favorite cake her mother, Ruth Schultz, made and served at her "Ruth's Restaurant." Enjoy!

SUN PICKLES

- 1 gallon jug/jar
- 3 stalks fresh dill
- 1 tsp. powdered alum
- 5 garlic buds
- 6 cups water
- 3 1/4 cups white vinegar
- 1 Tbsp. Pickling spice (optional)
- 2/3 cup canning salt (prefer 1/3 cup salt)

Small cucumbers to fill jar/jug. Alternate cucumbers, fresh dill and garlic in jug/jar. Add salt, alum, spices. Pour vinegar over cucumbers. Then add water to fill jar. Be sure to use all the vinegar versus the water. Place jar in a sunny area outside for 2 days and 2 nights. Bring in the house. Place jar in refrigerator to chill. Ready to eat. Will keep for 1 year. I prefer 1/3 cup salt and no spices.

APPLE DESSERT

- 1/2 cup flour
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- Dash of nutmeg
- Dash of cinnamon
- 1 egg
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup chopped apples
- 1/2 cup nuts

Mix and sift first six ingredients. Stir in unbeaten egg and vanilla. Fold in apples and nuts. Turn in to well greased 8" pie plate. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes or until light brown. Serve with whipped cream.

Michigan DNR Fishing Tips—

Go 'hunting' for fish this fall

Autumn can be one of the best times of year to seek out your favorite fish species for a day of fun angling. Several species to target this October and November include walleye, perch and trout.

Walleye are thought to be in their best condition in the fall and often can be found in the river mouth areas of larger, inland lakes. They're gathering there to take advantage of baitfish that like to hang out as the weather cools off. Set your sights on 10-12 feet deep to find these guys.

Perch also populate around these same river mouths, but these fish likely will be much closer to the river than walleye. Check out depths as shallow as 4 feet to find them.

Trout, available in some of these larger lakes during this time as well, can be found in the same areas as walleye and perch.



MI Vote Matters high school challenge aims to increase young voter knowledge and participation

On last week's National Voter Registration Day, Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson announced a new program with nonpartisan partner organizations that will seek to increase young voter knowledge and participation by ensuring that eligible high school seniors register or pre-register to vote.

The MI Vote Matters High School Voter Registration Challenge (Michigan.gov/MIVoteMatters) encourages high schools across Michigan to help connect students with their right to vote through civic education and nonpartisan voter registration drives. Schools can strive for the highest voter registration rate and earn recognition from the Secretary of State for the percentage of eligible seniors who have registered or pre-registered:

- Gold for 90% and above
- Silver for 70% and above
- Bronze for 50% and above

"All high schools in the state are invited to participate in the MI Vote Matters challenge and to encourage students who are eligible to register to vote," Secretary Benson said. "When young people empower themselves as voters, they make our democracy stronger."

In Michigan, teenage residents who are U.S. citizens and at least 17.5 years old can pre-register to vote and then automatically become active voters once they turn 18. Some students will have their first opportunity to vote in the Nov. 2, 2021 election.

In the MI Vote Matters program, once students have registered or pre-registered to vote, they will submit a pledge to vote card either online or by paper in order for their registration to count toward their school's participation numbers. The program runs through June 30, 2022.

The Secretary of State's Office is partnering with several nonpartisan organizations that already have standing high school voter registration programs, including:

- Inspire2Vote, a program of Project High Hopes
- League of Women Voters of Michigan
- Michigan Center for Civic Education
- When We All Vote, an initiative within Civic Nation

"The Michigan Center for Civic Education (MCCE) celebrates the Michigan Department of State for recognizing the importance of engaging all voters, especially those in

their most formative years, in the importance of voting," said Ellen Zwarenstein, Executive Director of the MCCE.

"Young adult engagement is critical and their perspectives are vital as they help to shape their world as it is now while imagining their own preferred futures. This program integrates the knowledge and the skills for vibrant and healthy civic communities."

High school administrators can request an action kit at Michigan.gov/MIVoteMatters and will be provided with all the materials needed to get started. The League of Women Voters of Michigan also has a voter registration presentation that is available for use or League members can present the program in person if requested.



Do not sign Secure MI Vote petition

The foundation of democracy is free and fair elections that reflect the will of the people. Now, Secure MI Vote, is an effort to undo the will of Michigan voters who overwhelmingly approved Proposition 3 in 2018, amending the constitution to expand voting rights.

Chinook & coho salmon runs have begun; DNR gears up for egg takes

The days are getting cooler, the leaves are beginning to change and the salmon are starting their annual spawning runs – all signs that the Michigan Department of Natural Resources is preparing for Chinook and coho salmon egg

Managing Michigan's world-class fisheries is dependent on egg takes each fall. Salmon return to the rivers and streams where they were hatched or stocked. To aid in annual egg collection, the DNR has strategically placed weirs in rivers with high concentrations of spawning salmon.

DNR facilities begin operations in mid-September and complete the process in late October for all Pacific salmon egg takes. Though the egg collection work is scheduled, the DNR team will act only when there are sufficient numbers to indicate the fish are ready. Conditions can vary day to day.

DNR staff conduct egg takes not only to support Michigan's yearly fish production goals, but also to assist other Great Lakes states in meeting their fishery needs. This season, portions of Michigan-collected eggs will be directed to Illinois and Indiana.

Chinook egg takes occur on the Little Manistee River at the Little Manistee River Weir facility. This work typically occurs during the first week of October. The DNR plans on collecting 2.5 million eggs for Michigan's waters, as well as 600,000 eggs for Indiana and 800,000 eggs for Illinois, in support of each state's salmon stocking programs.

Coho egg takes on the Platte River at the Platte River State Fish Hatchery typically occur during the third week of October. The DNR plans on collecting 3 million eggs for Michigan's waters, as well as 1.1 million for Indiana and 1 million for Illinois.

All eggs collected for out-of-state needs are reared in that state's hatchery facilities and stocked in the Great Lakes.

Egg take operations are open to the public to allow visitors to see these amazing fish and the process of harvesting their eggs. Weir tours combined with education and outreach efforts bring classrooms and hundreds of students to the facilities every year to learn about the life cycle of fish, invasive species, the history of salmon in the Great Lakes and the DNR programs that manage and sustain these prized fisheries.

DNR mineral rights auction encourages public comment

State Sen. Lana Theis, R-Brighton, on Wednesday alerted Livingston County residents to an upcoming Department of Natural Resources sealed-bid auction to lease state-owned nonmetallic mineral rights at a former sand and gravel pit in Genoa Township.

The DNR will issue one mineral lease with a goal of using the property in the future as a tree seed orchard to produce seedlings for distribution throughout the state. It was chosen for this purpose due to its proximity to the State Forest Tree Improvement Center.


The department will accept sealed bids from Dec. 13 through Jan. 3, 2022 for three specific parcels at the site. The parcels are:

- 35.47 acres of Section 33, T02N, R05E SE1/4 of NE1/4, excluding a parcel of land containing 3.78 acres; also excluding westerly of the centerline of Chilson Road.
- .75 acres of Section 33, T02N, R05E The part of the SE1/4 of NE1/4 lying westerly of the centerline of Chilson Road.
- 38.17 acres of Section 33, T02N, R05E NE1/4 of NE1/4 except the north 60 feet.

The DNR is also welcoming public comments regarding the auction. Those wishing to submit a comment should do so by Oct. 27 via email to DNR-Minerals@michigan.gov or vennek@michigan.gov, or by mailing a letter to DNR, Minerals Management Section, P.O. Box 30452, Lansing, MI 48909.



Livingston Lamplighters to relaunch as a Family Chorus

After a 15-month COVID hiatus, the Livingston Lamplighters have relaunched as the Livingston Lamplighters Family Chorus. Formerly an all-male barbershop group, they now welcome all men, women and youth who love to sing.

During the forced break the chorus lost one member to COVID-19, plus four other members to natural causes, according to Scott Turner, Lamplighters President. This was an emotional blow to the chorus, and depleted the membership during a time when it was impossible to rebuild. "The pandemic was creating a new and very different world, and we knew we would have to adapt to thrive," he said. "In our planning, we called it Lamplighters 2.0."

The Lamplighters actually began admitting women into their membership in late 2019, shortly after the Barbershop Harmony Society changed their rules to allow local chapters to do so. The first few members to join were family members of current Lamplighters. "We were made to feel welcome from the beginning," said Jenna Hoyer, one of the pioneers and now Vice President of Membership Development.

From March 2020 until June 2021 the chorus kept in touch through occasional Zoom meetings, and they even recorded one virtual performance, according to Turner. They resumed in-person rehearsals in June at the home of one of the members. In September, they were able to return to their previous meeting space at The Well Church in Brighton and re-launched as the Livingston Lamplighters Family Chorus. The a cappella chorus has enjoyed an influx of new singers which has created much greater diversity – at a typical rehearsal around half of the singers are women and youth.

The chorus has also broadened their repertoire, says Director Jason Hall. They still sing traditional barbershop songs, but they have added more current songs that appeal to all age groups. "We're currently working on a custom arrangement of *Johnny B. Good*," said Hall, "and our Christmas song list includes *Slow Rockin' Christmas* in addition to the classic Christmas songs."

Turner said the relaunch allows the Lamplighters to continue their tradition of charitable community involvement. In the past, the chorus has provided Thanksgiving dinners to more than 100 military veterans and their families each year. "We are looking forward to singing in support of a variety of local charitable organizations as conditions permit," he said.

Hall said that the combination of long-standing members and talented new singers is producing a unique sound and a new level of energy. "We've had a lot of fun at rehearsals blending the old and new voices," he said. The chorus hopes to perform their annual Christmas concert series at area senior assisted living centers this December.

Rising costs, staffing shortage cited as top problems facing small businesses

A new survey done by the Small Business Association of Michigan showed that while wages and staffing levels have begun to increase, rising costs and finding enough staff are still the top problems businesses are facing.

"The pandemic has been difficult for small businesses, but it's clear that entrepreneurs are adapting and taking action to position their businesses for success," said SBAM President Brian Calley.

The survey was conducted the week after President Biden announced a federal vaccine mandate and revealed the policy to be significantly underwater with 58% of small business owners opposed and 29% in favor. Thirteen percent expressed no opinion.

"It's not surprising that most business owners oppose the vaccine mandate, especially given the worker shortage," said Calley.

The survey, conducted September 10-17, of more than 680 Michigan small businesses, also revealed that:

- 77% of businesses reported that COVID-19 had a negative impact on their business in 2020, and 67 percent of businesses are still feeling the effects.
- 79% of businesses reported higher cost increases than before the pandemic.
- 64% of those surveyed said it's significantly harder to keep their business fully staffed.
- 19% of businesses have increased their workforce size since Jan. 2020, even in the face of workforce shortages and lost revenues.
- 47% of small businesses expect to grow employment levels over the next year.
- 62% of businesses increased wages since the start of 2020 to attract and maintain employees.
- 24% of businesses reported increasing employee compensation by more than 10 percent since Jan. 2020.
- 55% of businesses reported reduced revenues in 2020 compared to 2019. 29% of those small businesses experienced a decline of more than 25%.
- 83% of those surveyed expect revenues to stabilize or increase in 2021.
- 16% of small businesses are pessimistic about the long-term survival of their business.

The Small Business Association of Michigan focuses solely on serving the needs of Michigan's small business community through advocacy, collaboration and buying power. Today they serve over 28,000 members in all 83 counties of Michigan. SBAM is located in Lansing, just one block from the Capitol.

Letter to the Editor

To comment further on Tim Schnelle's letter in support of teachers, which was published in your September 26th edition, we can all look for ways to provide additional support for teachers. Among these are initiatives by individual citizens and the policies of our local governmental bodies.

For example, the Livingston County Board of Commissioners failed to accept \$1,500,000 in grants from the state which, among other things, would have supported Covid abatement measures for local schools. Further, although \$37 million in Covid relief funds were allocated to the county, no action has yet been announced by the Commissioners on citizen proposals to allocate part of the funds toward extending broadband to every Livingston County household – an infrastructure which would benefit both teachers and their students in meeting education goals during the pandemic, while generally increasing the quality of life and economic opportunities in the county.

As quarantines are extended due to the recent hot spots in the Hartland and Howell schools, the importance of broadband internet increases. We should also support efforts to assist in the cost of educating teachers, in mentoring them during their first years of teaching and in providing more, and better paid, support staff and paid internships for student educators. Further, while many discussions center around the pay of seasoned teachers who have completed advanced degrees, refilling teacher ranks must focus on increased starting salaries for young teachers.

Vaccination is still the best public health prevention strategy to end the COVID-19 pandemic. Individuals aged 12 years and older are eligible for COVID-19 vaccination and are encouraged to receive their vaccination, if they have not already. Additionally, according to the newest CDC recommendations, the following groups of people are now eligible to receive a booster dose of Pfizer's COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after their Pfizer primary series:

- People 65 years and older.
- Residents 18 years and older in long-term care settings.
- People ages 18-64 with underlying medical conditions.
- People ages 18-64 who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting.

The booster dose recommendations only apply to individuals who received the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine for their primary series. There is currently no booster recommendation for those who received the Janssen or Moderna vaccine for their primary series. Individuals who received the Moderna or Janssen vaccine cannot receive a booster dose of Pfizer vaccine.

People with COVID-19 may be asymptomatic or have a wide range of symptoms, ranging from mild to severe. Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus.



Little Known Social Security Program Helps Seniors Manage Their Money**Dear Savvy Senior,**

Does Social Security offer any special help to beneficiaries who struggle managing their benefits? My aunt, who has no children, has dementia and struggles keeping up with her bills and other financial duties.

*Inquiring Niece***Dear Inquiring,**

Yes, Social Security actually has a little-known program known as the "representative payee program" that helps beneficiaries who need help managing their Social Security benefit payments. Here's what you should know.

Representative Payee Program

Authorized by congress back in 1939, the Social Security representative payee program provides money management help to beneficiaries who are incapable of managing their Social Security income. Beneficiaries in need of this help are often seniors suffering from dementia, or minor children who are collecting Social Security survivors' benefits.

Currently more than 5 million Social Security beneficiaries have representative payees.

Representative payees also handle benefits for nearly 3 million recipients of Supplemental Security Income (SSI), a Social Security administered benefit program for low-income people who are over 65, blind or disabled.

Who Are Payees?

A representative payee is typically a relative or close friend of the beneficiary needing assistance, but Social Security can also name an organization or institution for the role – like a nursing home or social-service agency.

Some of duties of a representative payee include:

- Using the beneficiary's Social Security or SSI payments to meet their essential needs, such as food, shelter, household bills and medical care. The money can also be used for personal needs like clothing and recreation.
- Keeping any remaining money from benefit payments in an interest-bearing bank account or savings bonds for the beneficiary's future needs.
- Keeping records of benefit payments received and how the money was spent or saved.
- Reporting to Social Security any changes or events that could affect the beneficiary's payments (for example, a move, marriage, divorce or death).
- Reporting any circumstances that affect the payee's ability to serve in the role.

As a representative payee, you cannot combine the beneficiary's Social Security payments with your own money or use them for your own needs. The bank account into which benefits are deposited should be fully owned by the beneficiary, with the payee listed as financial agent.

Some payees, generally those who do not live with the beneficiary, are required to submit annual reports to Social Security accounting for how benefits are used. For more information on the responsibilities and restrictions that come with the role, see the Social Security publication "A Guide for Representative Payees" at SSA.gov/pubs/EN-05-10076.pdf.

How to Get Help

If you believe your aunt may need a representative payee, call Social Security at 800-772-1213 and make an appointment to discuss the matter at her local office. Applying to serve as a payee usually requires a face-to-face interview.

Social Security may consider other evidence in deciding if a beneficiary needs a payee and selecting the person to fill the role, including doctors' assessments and statements from relatives, friends and others in a position to give an informed opinion about the beneficiary's situation.

You should also know that if you become your aunt's representative payee you cannot collect a fee for doing it. However, some organizations that serve in the role do receive fees, paid out of the beneficiary's Social Security or SSI payments.

New protections in place for vulnerable adults as Financial Exploitation Prevention Act goes into effect

Vulnerable adults in Michigan will have new protections in place with the Financial Exploitation Prevention Act having taken effect this past Sunday, Sept. 26. The statute enacts

new requirements on financial institutions to ensure they have training and procedures in-place to better recognize the signs of financial exploitation and take action to protect those who are unable to protect themselves from abuse, neglect, or exploitation because of a mental or physical impairment or because of advanced age.

The Act is the result of collaborative work led by the Department of Attorney General's Elder Abuse Task Force, the Michigan Bankers Association, the Michigan Credit Union League, the Prosecuting Attorney's Association of Michigan, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, Michigan State Police, Michigan Sheriffs' Association and Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police.

"Victims of financial exploitation do not usually know they are being taken advantage of, which is why it is so important that our financial institutions have the tools and training they need to help keep vulnerable individuals safe," said Governor Gretchen Whitmer. "This Act increases protections for Michiganders from unscrupulous individuals trying to exploit them. I am proud of the partnership between several government agencies and private sector entities to ensure Michiganders are protected from fraud."

"I continue to be proud of the important change our Elder Abuse Task Force is achieving through its diligent work," said Attorney General Dana Nessel. "This Act is the result of prioritizing our vulnerable adults through consumer protection measures and education, and financial institutions will play a vital role in preventing exploitation. The partnership between financial institutions, prosecutors, Adult Protective Services, and law enforcement will result in earlier detection and successful prosecution of those that prey on our vulnerable citizens."

"With the appropriate training and procedures in place, Michigan's financial institutions will be better equipped to identify and report exploitation to protect our state's seniors and other vulnerable adults," said DIFS Director Anita Fox. "Our state's financial institutions work hard every day for the communities they serve, and this Act gives them additional tools to help recognize and stop fraud."

Signed into law on December 30, 2020 by Gov. Whitmer, the Financial Exploitation Prevention Act requires financial institutions to develop and implement policies, training, and procedures for identifying and reporting the exploitation of their customers. It also allows financial institutions to freeze customer transactions or assets under certain circumstances; provides immunity from criminal, civil, or administrative liability to financial institutions for actions taken in good faith under the Act; and provides for the powers and duties of certain governmental officers and entities to enforce the Act.

Former state Rep. Hank Vaupel, as chair of the House Health Policy Committee, held a town hall on elder abuse and related issues held in Howell in 2019, seeking to promote this legislation. Attorney General Dana Nessel was a featured speaker at that meeting.

The Department of Attorney General is offering an educational presentation on the Act and elder financial exploitation prevention to interested groups. Eligible groups include but are not limited to elder abuse coalitions, area agencies on aging, law enforcement, and financial institution professionals.

Groups interested in attending a presentation are asked to email AG-PA@michigan.gov with the following information: subject line that states "FEPA Presentation Request"; a brief description of the professional background of potential attendees; the number of people likely to attend; potential dates and times that will work well for the group (flexibility is encouraged); and The format of the presentation (virtual presentations are recommended).

Those bills have received hearings in both the House and Senate. If passed, the bills will achieve the remainder of the Task

Force's first initiatives.

The Elder Abuse Task Force, which Nessel launched shortly after taking office, consists of more than 55 different organizations in the public, private and nonprofit sections – all working together to combat elder abuse.

The Department of Attorney General provides a library of resources for consumers to review anytime on a variety of topics.

Fowlerville Village improvement project gets 'green light' thanks to grant

A planned street and infrastructure improvement project in the Village of Fowlerville has gotten the 'green light' thanks to a state grant.

The project will involve North Benjamin Street (north of Grand River), along with Devonshire Drive and Pinewood Drive. The work will include installing new sanitary sewer, storm sewer, and water lines and reconstructing and repaving the roadways. Work is expected to begin next spring and be completed in the fall.

The Village learned last week that it was one of 11 communities

in the state selected for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) that helps fund improvements and upgrades to existing water, sewer and wastewater public systems.

The grant is for \$1.9 million, with the Village required to make a local match of \$896,069.

While this grant money and the local match will go for water and sewer improvements, along with associated engineering costs, the Village will include additional money to completely reconstruct the streets, install new curb and gutter and sidewalks and do other upgrades.

"We'll be abandoning the 1963 sanitary sewer line that runs on the back of the property lots on Devonshire Drive (near the county drain) and replace it with a new line in the

public right-of-way, which is where the utilities belong," said Village Manager Kathryn Rajala. "We're also replacing a cast-iron water main that dates back to 1927."

The installation of a new water line will include looping it into an existing nearby line which will improve the water quality and flow. Rajala noted that there is currently a dead-end on Benjamin Street which causes sediment to accumulate.

She noted that there'll be a complete removal and reconstruction of the roadway and this will include installing 12-to-30 inch storm sewer lines.

The Village has obtained CDBG grants in the past, with the money used to undertake similar combined street-and-infrastructure projects. Rajala, who has been involved in the more recent projects, including putting together the grant applications, said the recent effort was "the most detailed and complicated application I've worked on."

"It was very time consuming," she added. "We had applied previously for the grant without success, but had good news with this one."

This CDBG program is designed to assist low and moderate income communities in making these kind of improvements or upgrades. Fowlerville was one of 61 communities that submitted an application.

The 11 recipients were announced last Tuesday by the Michigan Economic Development Corporation and Gov. Gretchen Whitmer, with nearly \$15 million being awarded.

"Improving and updating our infrastructure is vital to the health of our residents and critical to the economic success of our communities," said Gov. Whitmer.

She added that "these MEDC grants will support infrastructure improvements that will have an immediate impact and help ensure the long-term wellbeing of our residents and our communities. Today's investments will help 11 communities across the state bolster access to safe drinking water."

Grants are awarded to eligible communities on a competitive basis. The applications were scored with an emphasis on percentage of low-to-moderate income residents and improvements or repairs related to health, sanitation and security, aging infrastructure, and capacity concerns.

To be considered for a grant, communities were required to have a locally approved Capital Improvements Plan, contribute a local minimum match of 10 percent of total project costs, demonstrate a maintenance plan for the project, and propose projects that benefitted the entire community. All projects must be completed by December 31, 2023.

The Michigan Strategic Fund also approved up to \$550,000 in CDBG funds to provide administrative services to assist the communities with the compliance and administrative requirements of the awards.
