Institutional Justice, Individual Mercy

One of the key responsibilities of government is to execute justice. The legislature should support this end by passing fair, responsible laws that promote peace and order. The courts are to issue just judgments on difficult issues with impartiality. The president must uphold the Constitution, laws, and judgments with integrity and lead through example and influence for a just system. Justice is a central component of a well-ordered society that alleviates the constraints of anarchy, and the government must know and carry out sound justice.

As Americans, we expect our government to embody and properly implement justice, and the Constitution even enshrines this expectation in its preamble. The Constitution's objectives are to "form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity..." that imperfect governments and societies do not produce perfect justice, Americans have acted throughout our history to improve our country toward a more perfect form of justice. The pursuit of justice was a major contributor to the Civil War; it drove the civil rights movement; and it remains a central point of attention for a host of issues from new legislation to Supreme Court nominees.

This longstanding preoccupation with justice is encouraging because it means we are interested in preserving a fairer, securer society. Rather than indulging in our worst impulses, justice enables a more responsible system of due process. When justice is properly prioritized, we do not have to take issues into our own hands because there is a just way to deal with grievances. This places a check on raw emotions and reactive tendencies that we would likely later regret. While acknowledging that the application is not perfect because it is run by imperfect humans, the idealized system of institutional justice provides a balanced structure that empowers fairness for all.

Institutional justice is a necessity, but agreement with that statement does not preclude individual mercy.

As individuals, we are often so fixated on justice that I think we miss this critical duality. We can expect justice from the system while still demonstrating personal mercy to the fullest, which is no less critical for a successful society. The system must maintain a just order, but we can still "love [our] enemies, bless them that curse [us], do good to them that hate [us], and pray for them which despitefully use [us], and persecute [us]" (Matthew 5:44).

What is our outlook and motivation? Are we looking for excuses to lay down the hammer and put others in their place? Or are we looking for ways to show love, help others up, and build stronger communities together? The government is the institutional tool of justice, and we are right to expect just decisions and policies. But as individuals, we can also live lives that are filled with mercy and love.

Summative assessments measure what students are expected to know and be able to do at specific grade levels and in specific content areas. It provides 9-10 grade students the chance to practice their skills for their 11th grade SAT and gives all students the chance to take these assessments free of charge and in a familiar location.

SMOKED SALMON DIP

• 1 14-16oz can pink or red salmon, drained, remove skin & bones, flaked

- 1 8oz cream cheese, softened
- 1 small red onion, diced (1 1/2 Tablespoons)
- 1 1/2 Tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon liquid liquid smoke or more to taste
- 1/2 teaspoon red or black pepper
- 1 1/2 Tablespoons ground horseradish

• 1/4 teaspoon salt

Mix all ingredients with a blender. Chill in fridge overnight. Stir with a spoon or fork before serving. Sprinkle with nuts before serving (optional). Serve with crackers. This is delicious!

Note: I used 2 1/2 8oz cream cheese, 2 Tablespoons lemon juice, 3/4 teaspoon liquid smoke, and 2 Tablespoons horseradish. Tastes better and goes further. I do not use nuts, if there's leftovers, nuts become soggy. -Doris Bowers

- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 lb carton sour cream
- 8oz shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 Tablespoons sugar
- salt and pepper to taste

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Howell Township home-repair business owner seeks State House Seat

Glen Miller—a Howell Township home repair specialist is running as a Democratic candidate for the new 50th State House District, stating that he has " solid, actionable ideas for how to make Lansing responsive to the real needs of Livingston County families."

"In coming weeks, I will release my Contract with Livingston, a contract that I will enter into with you, the voters of District 50," Miller said. "It will be my checklist and my promise of how I will make Livingston County a better place to live and raise your family. If I do not keep my promise, promise me one thing – that you will fire me and move on. But if I honor the contract, then I will ask you to reelect me in 2024 so we can continue our progress together."

The contract will cover making sure the entire district is connected to affordable, high-quality internet; fair elections;

transparency; violence prevention; individual liberties; protecting public schools; help for real farmers; and protecting our natural resources.

"Like many of you, I am no stranger to hard work. I work with my head and my hands every day, and I will bring that same work ethic to the job of representing you in Lansing," he said.

Miller notes that he doesn't exactly fit the stereotype of the typical Democrat, being a self-employed business owner and an avid hunter. But he says that his background as a

> blue-collar worker fits better with the average person in the district than if he were a lawyer, a lobbyist, or a career politician like most members of the State House and State Senate.

"I don't think many people know what State Reps really do. It's really important. They set budget priorities, manage public health, fund public schools and community colleges, and oversee law enforcement and corrections," he said.

Miller said he will seek out leadership roles in Lansing to fight for these issues and will do a better job than the incumbent of sharing his views on them with his constituents.

Miller describes himself as a "different kind of Democrat," who is free from "the handful of well-connected interests that give Livingston County its own version of the 'swamp'." He pledges to hold regular meetings and coffee hours in the district to hear what is on residents' minds and to let them know about the legislation being considered in the House. He will also share information at least weekly on a Facebook page.

While he pledges to run a positive campaign, he says that 50th District voters need to face up to what the Republican Party has become. In Miller's words, it's now "a collection of ideologues with no real policy ideas, just a commitment to using hot-button social issues like abortion, so-called critical race theory, and disinformation about the 2020 election to keep their base fired up so they won't stay home on election day," despite their candidates offering no solutions beyond slogans about "owning the Libs."

"My opponent," Miller says, "has recently debased his integrity another big notch" in calling for a forensic audit of 2020 election results in the state. Miller noted that such audits have already taken place in Arizona, Georgia, Wisconsin, and Pennsylvania, and "not a single one has found any irregularities in ballot-counting."

"My opponent knows perfectly well that Biden's 7-million vote trouncing of former president Trump was a landslide, but here he goes playing to diehard Trumpers who refuse to move on," Miller said. "God help us if he actually believes the nonsense on Fox, Breitbart, and OAN!"

If elected in November, Miller pledges to support "our hard-working State, County, city, and township clerks," who ran the cleanest election in American history despite an unprecedented pandemic. "When people like my opponent raise fears about ballot-counting, they undercut our clerks – and hell, nearly all of those clerks are Republicans! and stoke mistrust of the system that makes our democracy work," he says.

Miller said he has clear ideas for how to reorient the State's budget priorities, with an emphasis on public health, mental health, senior and veterans' services, and especially affordable broadband. High-speed internet, he feels, should be a regulated public utility, just like the post office, gas and electric utilities, and waste treatment.

"The internet is to our century what the post office and Ma Bell were to the previous one," he pointed out, aading that "trying to function without affordable access to a high-speed connection has become impossible, which gives those with good connections a big and unfair advantage over those who don't."

With lots of federal funds sloshing around to address the lack of affordable high-speed broadband, Miller says, "There's just no excuse for us not making a once-in-ageneration investment to fix this."

The new 50th House District in which Miller is running includes nearly all of the western half of Livingston County the entire townships of Cohoctah, Conway, Deerfield, Handy, Hartland, Howell, Iosco, Marion, Oceola, and Unadilla; plus the southern part of Tyrone Township, the western half of Putnam Township, and the city of Howell.

Miller serves on the Howell Township Planning Commission. He has lived in Livingston County for 17 years, the past ten of those in Howell Township. He is a licensed builder and has operated *Glen Miller the Home Doctor*, a home remodeling business in the county, for more than 32 years.

He is a member of the Masonic Lodge #121 and was a member of the United Auto Workers Local 235 while working at Detroit Gear and Axle. In 2016, he was active in Bernie Sanders's primary campaign. As a youth, Miller was active in Boy Scouts and achieved the rank of Life Scout.

He and his wife, Michelle, have been married for 44 years and have one grown son.

Michigan DNR Fishing Tips— Find crappie in shallow water during spring Crappie are among the most difficult pan fish to pattern

because of their tendency to suspend in the water column, except in the spring. During this time, crappie move to shallow water - sometimes in water only a couple feet deep - to spawn, so there isn't a lot of water column to suspend in.

Crappies like both minnows and jigs. The easiest way to fish for them is to suspend the bait under a bobber, halfway between the surface and the bottom, around any sort of cover - weeds, brush, dock pilings ... whatever.

Anglers who prefer a more active approach can cast with jigs and swim them back or fly fish with minnow-imitating streamers. Just think shallow in spring.

The 2022 license year went into effect on April 1. We encourage anglers to check out this year's fishing guide for updates and regulations.

All anglers 17 years of age and older are required to have a fishing license.


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

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Some facts about Elgin, Texas where I worked as a radio disc jockey By Karen Grab

As I noted, in 1980 I was hired to work the night shift for a radio station in Texas. KELG's studio was located in Elgin, 25 miles east of Austin—the state capital. I worked there for five years while living in Austin.

Founded in 1872, Elgin lays claim to many things Texan, including first-class barbecue, mild and hot sausage, veterinary services and cattle breeding.

Elgin was named 'Sausage Capital of the World' in 1995 by the Texas Legislature. Elgin's historic downtown district was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1996. That district offered main-street scenery that movie producers seem to like for filming.

Elgin acted as Hometown USA for *Varsity Blues*, a spring 1998 production from Paramount Pictures and MTV films. Other feature films that were filmed there included: *In Broad Daylight* (1991), *What's Eating Gilbert Grape* (1992), *Children of the Corn IV: The Gathering* (1996) and *Dolly's Best Little Whorehouse* in Austin (1982).

Ray Culp is a native son, born there in 1941. He was a major league baseball pitcher with the Philadelphia Phillies (1963-66), Chicago Cubs (1967) and Boston Red Sox (1968-73).

Jake Helgren is another hometown celebrity, born there in 1981. He's now a screenwriter and film producer with *Christmas on the Menu* and *Dashing in December* among his many credits.

As I mentioned in the previous article, I was able to travel to Nashville in 1982 as a representative of KELG to attend the DJ Convention. A main purpose was to interview the musical performers.

It was a highlight of my career to meet the country artists that sang the songs we played on the air. We did promos, along with the interviews, and played them during our shows to promote their songs and albums. I loved every minute of the convention. As it turned out, this was the only time I was able to attend the event.






In a broader sense, it is asking if anyone else has felt this feeling before, who is in my "posse"? How many of you can say that you understand this song, that it hits you in the 'feels'



Each hexagon is made by adding up the numbers in the two hexagons below it. Fill in the missing numbers in these puzzles.



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U.S. Congress Report

Supporting Ukraine's Fight for Freedom

We have all been watching what has been happening in Ukraine over these past weeks – a ruthless Russian invasion and an incredible display of courage and resilience by the Ukrainian people.

Michiganders, especially those in the Ukrainian-American community, have been standing up to show their support.

And whether it's calling into my office or speaking with me on the ground, folks from across the 8th District have been making it clear they want Congress to act. With that in mind, I want to lay out the four pieces of concrete legislation I have introduced to support Ukraine's fight for freedom.

The Ukraine Lend-Lease Act

The Ukrainian people have no shortage of courage and bravery, but they do need Stinger missiles and Javelin antitank systems. To provide Ukraine with the might of American firepower, the bipartisan Ukraine Lend-Lease Act:

- Authorizes the President to lend or lease military
- equipment to Ukraine to bolster their defensive capabilities
- Streamlines the process of providing defense equipment support to Ukraine
- Requires the administration develop procedures to expedite the delivery of equipment to Ukraine

The American Energy for Europe Act

Because of Europe's dependence on Russian energy, they have been restrained in their ability to respond to Putin's aggression. To help wean them off Russian oil and gas, while also supporting American manufacturing, the bipartisan American Energy for Europe Act:

- Creates a Department of Energy program to reduce the reliance of European countries on Russian energy
- · Provides supplies and equipment to European allies
- Requires that the Secretary of Energy only approve projects that promote U.S. manufacturing

The DICTATOR Act:

While the world focuses on Ukraine, I haven't taken my eye off China and their relationship with Russia. Introduced with my colleague Rep. Young Kim (R-CA), the DICTATOR Act:

- Requires the State Department to conduct an investigation to determine whether China has helped Russia evade sanctions
- Directs the State Department to develop a strategy to block efforts by China to help Russia evade sanctions.
 Stop Russian Gold Act

The Russians are feeling the heat of U.S. sanctions, and we must slam shut every door they could use to evade them. Introduced by equal numbers of Republicans and Democrats, the Stop Russian GOLD Act:

- Closes a loophole to prevent Russia from using its gold reserves to evade sanctions
 - Directs the U.S. Treasury Department to develop

for the Village of Pinckney. Two years later, Undersheriff Pless was hired by the Green Oak Charter Township Police Department. 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Fowlerville woman killed on March 27 after colliding with wrong-way driver

A Fowlerville woman was killed on Sunday, March 27, after her vehicle collided head-on with a wrong-way driver. The accident occurred at about 3:15 a.m. on U.S. 131 in Grand Rapids.

Willow Rose Yon, 21, was pronounced dead after being taken to the hospital. She was a Fowlerville High graduate and was in her third year at Kendall College of Art and Design of Ferris State University. The campus is located in Grand Rapids.

Published reports stated that Yon was driving a 2019 Volkswagen Jetta northbound on U.S. 131, near 28th Street, when she was struck by a 22-year-old Grand Rapids woman driving southbound in her 2014 Chrysler 200. A tanker truck traveling just behind Yon side-swiped both vehicles during the crash.

The wrong-way driver was also taken to the hospital where she was listed in critical condition.

A GoFundMe account, organized by family friend Nichole DeForest Whitt, was set up to help pay for the family's expenses and to safeguard Willow's memory by ensuring their VHS tapes and photos are adequately preserved. Here are the comments by Whitt on that page.

"The beloved Willow Rose Yon, who passed away on March 27th, 2022, was a wonderful daughter, sister, niece, granddaughter, and friend. Her sudden death from a tragic car accident has shocked our community and everyone who knew her. She leaves behind her loving family, Paul, Denise, Gage, and Ava Yon.

'Willow had many talents and gifts. She was a third-year


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

She even drew on her parents' walls with markers! She has taken all the art classes she could in elementary, junior high, and high school. Her favorite medium is sharpie and ball point pen."

State's latest spending bill reflects Mackinac Coalition guidance Commentary by James M. Hohman

Congress passed massive stimulus spending last March to help states that were expected to suffer revenue losses due to the pandemic. But because state tax revenues remained higher than expected, Michigan lawmakers were left figuring out how to spend all that money coming from Washington.

The Mackinac Center worked with a coalition of center-right allies and business organizations to etch out some principles to help guide legislators. Thankfully, those legislators were listening.

Here were the ideas we offered and how well the spending plan adopted last week by the Legislature reflects them. **Exercise due diligence and don't be in a hurry to accept these monies**

It took roughly a year for the Republican-majority legislature and Democratic governor to agree on a list of items, and even the latest did not allocate all of the federal money that had been transferred to the state.

Do not allow federal funds to undermine previous policy decisions

The ARPA money came with strings prohibiting the state from reallocating it to "directly or indirectly" lower taxes.

Federal guidelines from the U.S. Treasury later clarified that it would consider this a breach if any tax cuts caused a state to reduce revenue below inflation.

A basic problem with the Treasury rules is that inflation is up, and it's uncertain how long that will last. Lawmakers wouldn't know whether tax cuts would go beyond the guidelines until the year is over.

Beyond that, this rule is also likely unconstitutional. There are cases involving 21 states in courts right now and all four rulings on the policy question have been against broad federal prohibitions on state tax cuts. That includes a case from Kentucky, which is in the same federal judicial circuit as Michigan.

State lawmakers passed tax cut legislation. Even though Governor Whitmer vetoed it, the legislature did not allow the federal rules to undermine their priorities.

Do not create ongoing obligations from one-time funds

Most of the items in the new supplemental spending bill are for infrastructure projects that will not require ongoing commitments from state taxpayers. the state cover some of its \$362.1 million list of "primary infrastructure needs." That means that the state fixes things faster than it would otherwise.

There is some extra money for roads. The state is getting close to the point where it fixes roads faster than they fall apart, and extra federal funds relieve the state taxpayer of that cost.

In addition, there is a transfer into the state unemployment insurance system. State reserves had been depleted during the pandemic, so this shores up reserves and can offset some payroll tax increases.

Remember that local governments and schools have their own pots of money from federal aid

Local governments tend to own a lot of infrastructure. If the state focuses on using the money to improve long-term assets outside of what it owns, it will need to make payments to local governments. There are a number of transfers to local governments to pay for water infrastructure, parks and trails, roads, and others. The federal transfers to local governments may also get spent on these types of projects, too.

All told, the recently-approved spending bill recognizes many of the key ideas that our coalition highlighted from one year ago.
