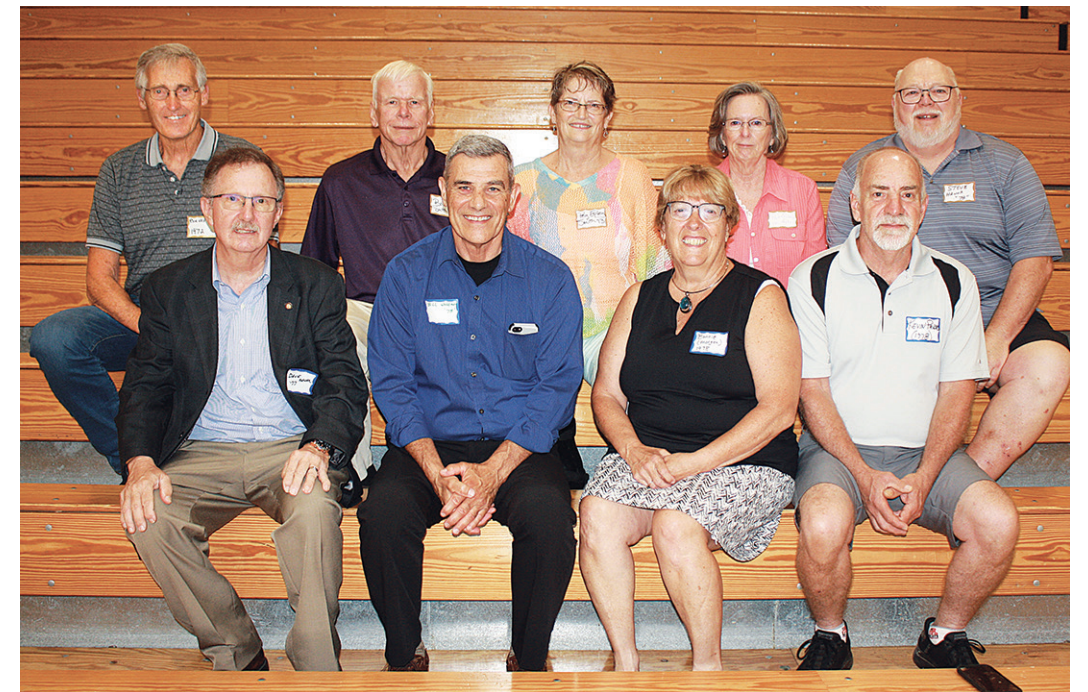

Fowlerville Independence Day Parade & Fireworks to be held on July 5th

The Fowlerville Independence Day Parade and Fireworks will take place on Sunday, July 5th.

“The decision to move our celebration back a day was made after the 4th of July Committee encountered an unexpected challenge while planning for the nation’s 250th anniversary celebration,” said Melissa Salgado, the chair of the committee.

“As planning began for the 2026 celebration, the committee anticipated continuing its longstanding relationship with the fireworks company that has provided displays for Fowlerville in previous years,” Salgado noted. “However, on May 28th, the vendor ultimately advised the committee that its resources had been committed to larger events associated with the nation’s 250th anniversary celebration.

“By the time that determination was made, many fireworks providers had already reached capacity for July 4th, creating

significant challenges for communities seeking to secure displays on the traditional holiday,” she said. “Faced with those circumstances, the committee evaluated several options to ensure that Fowlerville residents would continue to enjoy the high-quality celebration they have come to expect.”

One of those large events is Livingston County’s 250th Anniversary Fireworks Celebration that will take place on July 4th at the Howell Public Schools West Campus (the same site as the Balloonfest). Organizers have announced several activities that will take place at that event in addition to the fireworks display.

Given the situation and not wanting to scale back the event, the committee decided to become a premier sponsor of the neighboring celebration, along with changing its date to July 5th.

“The result is a full holiday weekend that allows residents and visitors to enjoy two days of patriotic festivities while preserving Fowlerville’s traditional parade and fireworks display,” said Salgado.

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Former teacher, longtime member of Hartland Audubon Nature Club has had 'a positive impact' as a birder

Benjamin Clark Blazier is proof that an individual can make a difference in the world and be the turning point in someone else's life. His shared passion and skills have been a source of encouragement and optimism that lead others to pursue their dreams and goals. Benjamin Clark Blazier is now part of something greater than himself.

Ben, as he likes to be called, has been a photographer, lecturer, environmental steward of the Huron River Watershed Council, bluebird box monitor, and a long-time member and officer of Hartland Audubon Nature Club.

Some of his photographs, mostly birds, have been published but most have been gifted. However, his most impactful role was that of a middle-school teacher in Holly Michigan where he taught history and ornithology. His ornithology classes produced some of Michigan's most avid birders.

If you have a conversation with Ben, he is humble and unassuming but beams with pride as he reports the top bird lister in Michigan was his student, Adam Byrne. Adam is Secretary of the Michigan Bird Records Committee and leads Team e-bird Michigan where he reviews Michigan bird sighting submissions for the international database managed by the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology in Ithaca, New York.

Adam said that Ben's "influence and dedication certainly guided my career

aspirations into science, where I pursued a degree at Cornell University and a lifetime passion for birds".

Scott Terry and Brad Murphy, also Ben's students, work with Adam at Team e-bird Michigan and have their own impressive bird lists. Ben has remained friends with many of his former students—Ryan Welch, Jason St. Pierre, John McDaniel and Adam Kieb—who, sometimes with Ben, bird worldwide. Brad and Craig Bradburn assisted Ben on his latest bird banding mission.

Bluebirds also benefit from Ben's attention. For forty years he has installed, maintained and monitored around two hundred bluebird boxes in various locations in Genesee, Shiawassee and Livingston Counties. Annually, he disinfects, evicts uninvited occupants like house sparrows and wrens, counts eggs, watches hatchlings and rejoices with successful fledglings. Even now in his 80's, Ben still does the field work to monitor 49 boxes sponsored by the Hartland Audubon Nature Club.

Ben Blazier, living up to his name has been a spark, igniting interest among Michigan's top birders and creating a ripple effect of positive change in our community and beyond. He has shown us how a passionate individual has the power to make a lasting, meaningful and effective change to better the world.

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Coalition says statewide emergency operations would be jeopardized by funding cuts in new budget

Proposed budget cuts for the State EMS Office would threaten EMS (Emergency Medical Services) operations statewide, a coalition of Michigan’s EMS organizations has warned.

The coalition sent a letter to state lawmakers and Gov. Whitmer last Tuesday, June 2, voicing strong concerns that continued budget reductions to the Division of EMS and Systems of Care, within the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS), would jeopardize critical public safety functions that support emergency care systems across Michigan.

“This is not simply a budget issue—it is a public safety issue,” said Angela

Madden, executive director of the Michigan Association of Ambulance Services. “The EMS office provides the oversight, coordination and support that emergency responders and hospitals rely on every day. Further funding reductions would have consequences throughout Michigan’s emergency care system, potentially affecting response readiness, workforce stability and patient outcomes. We urge state leaders to restore full funding and protect these essential services.”

The Division of EMS and Systems of Care sustained a 37% budget reduction in Fiscal Year 2026. Under the House and Senate’s current budget plans, the EMS Division is projected to experience an additional \$4.5 to \$5 million gap. While MDHHS worked to temporarily maintain operations, coalition members warn that another year of reduced funding could significantly impact emergency response coordination, EMS oversight, workforce support and statewide systems of care.

The Division oversees several essential functions that directly affect patient care and emergency response throughout the state, including:

- EMS agency and vehicle inspections
- EMT and paramedic licensing
- Statewide EMS data collection and reporting
- Trauma system coordination
- Support for regional Medical Control Authorities

In order to maintain current programs that EMS agencies rely upon, the EMS office would need \$10.4 million allocated in the Fiscal Year 2027 budget. Anything less will result in reductions within the State Office that will hurt EMS statewide.

“A strong EMS system doesn’t happen by accident—it requires state leadership, oversight and investment,” said Chris Stoecklein, president of the Michigan Association of Fire Chiefs. “The proposed funding reductions would

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Why do we do what we do?

Why do we do what we do?

Why do we feel passionate about what we do?

I think part of it comes from what we've been through... the moments that shaped us, the people who impacted us, and the things that stuck with us long after they were over. Some things we do just because we must—but the things we feel passionate about usually come from somewhere deeper.

It's not always loud or obvious either. Sometimes it's just a quiet pull... something that feels right, even when we can't fully explain it. Like a part of us recognizing purpose before our mind can put words to it.

And maybe that passion—that pull—is just another way of love showing up in our lives. Guiding us, stretching us, reminding us that what we do can mean something... even in small ways.

I'm reminded of the Good Samaritan story. It's something that can speak to both religious and secular perspectives. For those who may not be familiar, it tells of a man who was beaten, robbed, and left on the side of the road, barely alive. People passed by him—one a priest who crossed to the other side, and another a scholar who saw him but chose to move on. They had their reasons, I'm sure. But they didn't stop.

Then came someone ordinary... someone who simply

saw the pain in front of him and chose not to look away. He stopped, tended to the man's wounds, cared for him, and even made sure anything else would be taken care of when he returned.

And the more I think about it, the more I see that as a holy moment.

That moment where he set aside himself—his schedule, his comfort, his preferences—and made himself available to something bigger. He didn't overthink it. He didn't try to justify it. He just responded to what was right in front of him.

I believe we all have moments like that. Small windows where we can open ourselves up to something higher than us—whether we call that God, Allah, Buddha, or simply a presence of love and peace.

When we make ourselves available like that, really amazing things can happen. But it starts with letting go of our own personal preferences... our need to be right, to be comfortable, or to have things go our way.

Because maybe that's what gets in the way more than anything else. That pull toward self-interest. That quiet fear that if we don't look out for ourselves first, no one else will. But the Good Samaritan shows us something different.

He shows us what it looks like to step beyond that... to choose compassion over convenience, love over indifference. And in that moment, his purpose became clear—not because of who he was, but because of what he chose to do.

And maybe that's how it works for us too.

Every time we move past ourselves—every time we choose what is good, even when it's not easy—we're stepping into one of those moments. A moment where passion and purpose meet.

Because in the end, it's not about doing everything all at once.

It's about this moment.

And then the next.

And the next.

Going forward, I want to take things a little slower. Before I get upset over things that don't align with my interests, I want to pause and think about the Good Samaritan.

To remember that moment... where someone chose compassion over convenience, and love over indifference.

And with that in mind, I hope to respond differently. Not based on reaction or self-interest, but on the good I want to put out into the world.

Because I'm starting to see that those small pauses—that choice to step back and realign—those are the moments that matter. Those are the moments where we either stay where we are, or step into something better.

And I can't control everything. I can't always control what people say or do. But I can control how I respond.

So I'll keep trying... moment by moment... to choose what is good.

weaken the very systems that ensure ambulances, hospitals and emergency responders can work together effectively when lives are on the line. We are urging lawmakers and the Governor to restore funding before EMS providers are left with less support to serve their residents."

If proposed cuts are enacted, Michigan's entire healthcare system will feel the reduced capacity of the EMS Office. This would include decreased support for agencies, longer inspection wait times, ceasing education opportunities and on-site trainings, suspension of in-kind work and user support, potential licensing delays and stoppage of paramedic exam development.

The letter was authored jointly by the Michigan Association of Ambulance Services, Michigan Association of Fire Chiefs, Michigan Health and Hospital Association, Michigan Association of Emergency Medical Technicians, Michigan College of Emergency Physicians, Michigan Association of Air Medical Providers, Society of Michigan EMS Instructor Coordinators and the Michigan Association of Emergency Medical Services Systems.

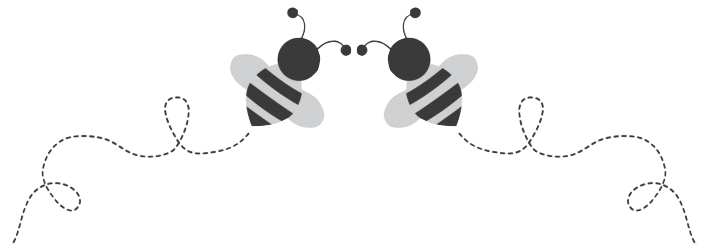

U.S. Congress Report

Launches Fifth Pillar of Blueprint for a Better America to Reform Campaign Finance

Congressman Tom Barrett (MI-07) has launched the fifth pillar of his Blueprint for a Better America: Reforming Campaign Finance. Included is Barrett's Constitutional Campaign Finance Reform Amendment. This constitutional amendment would guarantee Congress and state governments the authority to establish stricter campaign finance rules,

including limiting or prohibiting corporate spending in elections, to curb the outsized influence of money in politics and help ensure every citizen's voice carries equal weight at the ballot box.

"Americans are tired of watching billions of dollars flood into our elections while their own voices feel increasingly ignored," said Barrett. "Free speech and competitive campaigns are essential to our democracy, but our elections should not be determined by elite megadonors who have never been to Michigan. The Constitutional Campaign Finance Reform Amendment guarantees Congress and the states the authority to give the power in elections back to the people, restore confidence in our elections, and ensure that candidates spend more time serving their constituents than catering to special interests."

The Constitutional Campaign Finance Reform Amendment is endorsed by American Promise, a cross-partisan organization dedicated to giving the authority of elections back to the people and their representatives.

"What's striking about this moment is the overwhelmingly cross-partisan agreement that something must be done," said Jeff Clements, co-founder and CEO of American Promise. "Twenty-five state legislatures — representing red, blue and purple states alike — have called on Congress to support this amendment, often with unanimous support. We thank Representative Barrett for heeding the growing call of Americans and our states to move the constitutional amendment process forward."

Barrett also signed onto two pieces of legislation to increase accountability in campaign finance and to prohibit foreign nationals from spending money on American political activity or election administration. The two bills Barrett co-sponsored are:

The Campaign Finance Transparency Act (H.R. 8720) to increase accountability in federal campaign fundraising by requiring stronger verification for online donations, banning gift card contributions, requiring all donations to be reported regardless of amount, and cracking down on fraudulent donations made in someone else's name.

The Preventing Foreign Interference in American Elections Act (H.R. 8721) to crack down on foreign influence in U.S. elections by expanding restrictions on foreign-funded political activities and strengthening enforcement and disclosure requirements. The bill would prohibit non-citizens from donating to support ballot collection, voter registration, get-out-the-vote operations, election administration, and more — building on current law, which prohibits non-citizens from making contributions to help elect candidates.

BACKGROUND: Campaign spending has grown dramatically over the past several decades, with more than \$16 billion spent on federal elections during the 2024 cycle alone. As fundraising demands continue to increase, candidates are often forced to spend significant time soliciting donations rather than engaging with constituents and focusing on policy solutions. The growing influence of wealthy donors, special interests, and outside groups has contributed to everyday citizens feeling like their voices are no longer being heard.

Transparency matters

Taxpayers have a right to know when government mistakes could put billions of dollars at risk.

That is why I introduced House Bill 5813, which would require the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services to annually report Michigan's Medicaid error rate and improper payment rate. The online report would give the public access to more information and serve as a tool for legislators who play an important role overseeing how our tax dollars are spent.

This is about accountability.

Michigan receives nearly \$20 billion in federal Medicaid funding every year, and both state and federal leaders have a responsibility to ensure those dollars are being spent appropriately. High error rates and improper payments increase the risk of fraud and abuse, and threaten resources intended for the people who truly rely on Medicaid. Recent changes in federal law mean states that exceed certain Medicaid error-rate thresholds could face reductions in federal funding. Michigan cannot afford avoidable mistakes that put critical services and taxpayer dollars at risk.

The first step in fixing a problem is knowing it exists. Right now, the error rate is not publicly reported by the department. That is an issue.

Lawmakers are expected to oversee state government and make budget decisions involving billions of taxpayer dollars. They shouldn't have to guess whether Michigan is on track to meet federal standards or whether preventable errors are putting funding at risk.

This bill is straightforward. It requires the department to report the Medicaid error rate and improper payment rate each year using the same definitions found in federal law. The information would be provided to legislative oversight committees and made available to the public.

Sunlight is one of the best accountability tools government has. When agencies know their performance is being measured and reported, problems are more likely to be addressed before they become crises.

When billions of dollars are on the line, transparency isn't too much to ask.

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How Death Certificates Work

Why They Matter and Why Delays Happen

One of the questions I ask every family during an arrangement conference is, “How many death certificates do you think you’ll need?”

Most families look at me with a puzzled expression because, understandably, they’ve never had to think about it before.

That’s usually when I start explaining all the things a death certificate may be needed for.

Death certificates are one of the most important documents a family receives after a death. They serve as the official legal record of a person’s passing and are often required to handle everything from life insurance claims and bank accounts to pensions, investment accounts, property transfers, vehicle titles, and other estate matters.

Because every family’s situation is different, there isn’t a magic number that works for everyone. Someone with very few assets may only need a handful of certified copies, while someone with multiple bank accounts, investment accounts, life insurance policies, and property may need considerably more.

Part of my job during the arrangement conference is helping families think through what accounts and assets exist so we can estimate how many certified copies they’ll need. I’d much rather help a family order a few extra copies up front than have them discover months later that they need more and have to go through the process of obtaining additional certificates.

One thing many people don’t realize is that funeral directors don’t actually complete the entire death certificate ourselves.

The process begins with the funeral home gathering biographical information from the family. This includes information such as the person’s date and place of birth, parents’ names, marital status, education, military service, occupation, and other identifying details.

Once we enter that information into Michigan’s electronic registration system, the medical portion of the death certificate must be completed by the certifying physician, medical examiner, or coroner. This is where many delays occur.

Families are often surprised when I explain that the funeral home may have completed our portion within hours, yet we’re still waiting on the death certificate. That’s because we cannot finalize the document until the medical professional completes and signs their section.

The physician is responsible for determining and certifying the cause of death. Depending on the circumstances, this can

happen quickly—or it can take time.

If the death was expected and the physician is familiar with the patient’s medical history, the certificate may be signed relatively quickly. However, if the death was sudden, unexpected, under investigation, or requires involvement from the medical examiner’s office, the process can take considerably longer.

One statement I often find myself saying to families is, “The funeral home is waiting too.”

Trust me, funeral directors want death certificates completed just as much as families do. We know people are waiting to settle accounts, file insurance claims, transfer property, and take care of important matters. Unfortunately, until the medical certification is completed, there is very little we can do except continue following up and advocating on behalf of the family.

Another common misconception is that death certificates are immediately available after someone passes away. In reality, several steps have to occur before certified copies can be issued. The funeral home must complete the demographic information, the physician or medical examiner must certify the cause of death, and the death must then be filed with the local registrar before certified copies can be produced.

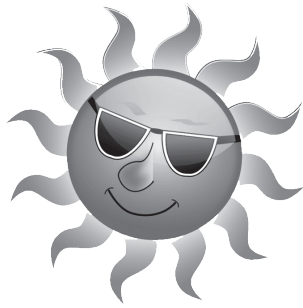
Another misconception I hear occasionally is that death certificates are needed immediately for everything. While they are certainly important, many organizations understand that obtaining certified copies takes time. In many cases, families can begin notifying banks, insurance companies, and other institutions before the certificates arrive.

One piece of advice I always give families is this: keep at least one certified death certificate in a safe place even after the estate has been settled. You never know when you may need it years down the road.

Death certificates are one of those things most people never think about until they suddenly need them. My hope is that understanding the process helps remove some of the uncertainty during an already difficult time.

And if you ever find yourself sitting across from me at an arrangement conference and I ask how many death certificates you’ll need, don’t worry if you don’t know the answer. Most people don’t. That’s why I’m here—to help guide you through it.

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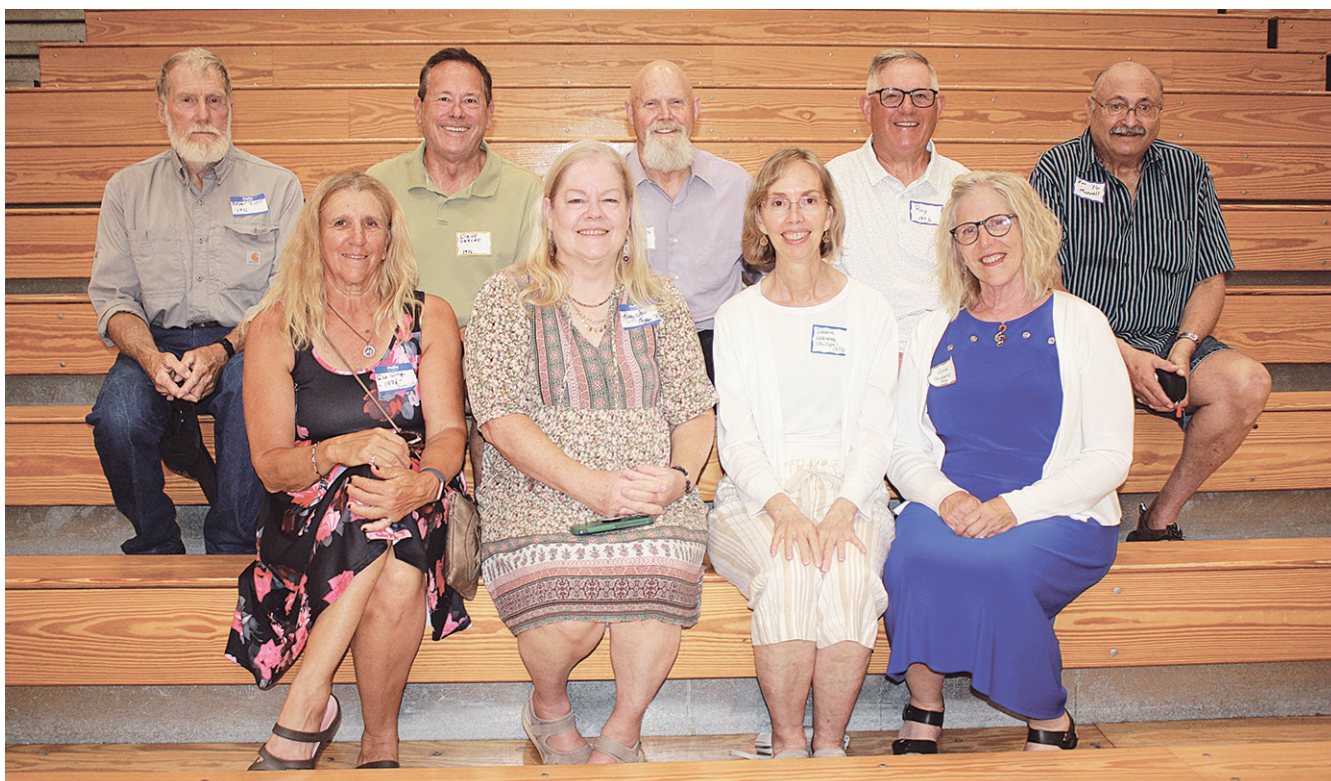

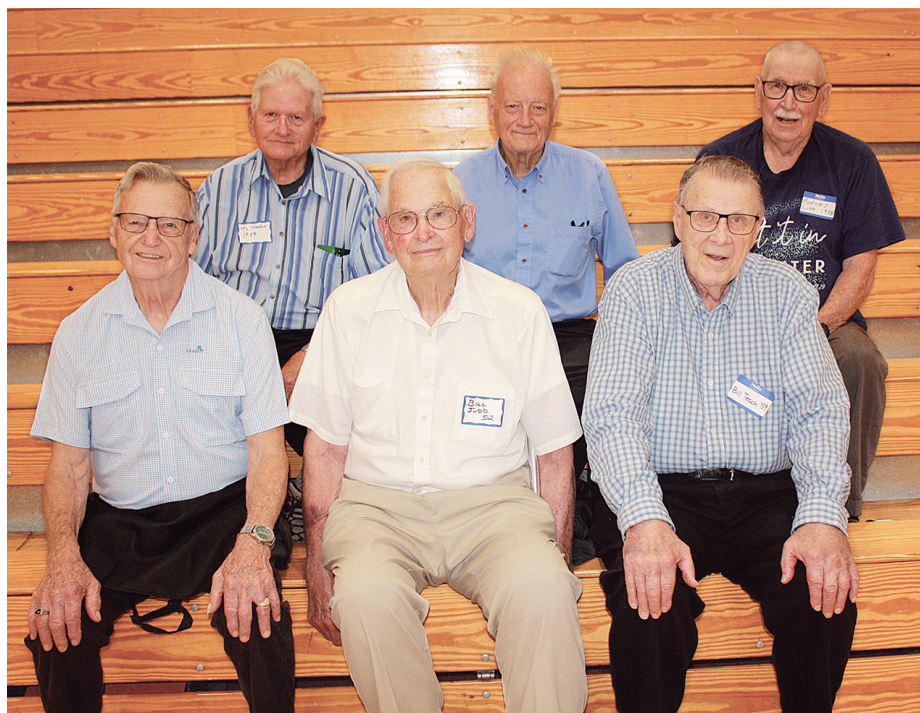
The event ended with former FHS cheerleaders taking to the front of the group and all sang a rousing chorus of "Gold & Purple", our beloved school song.

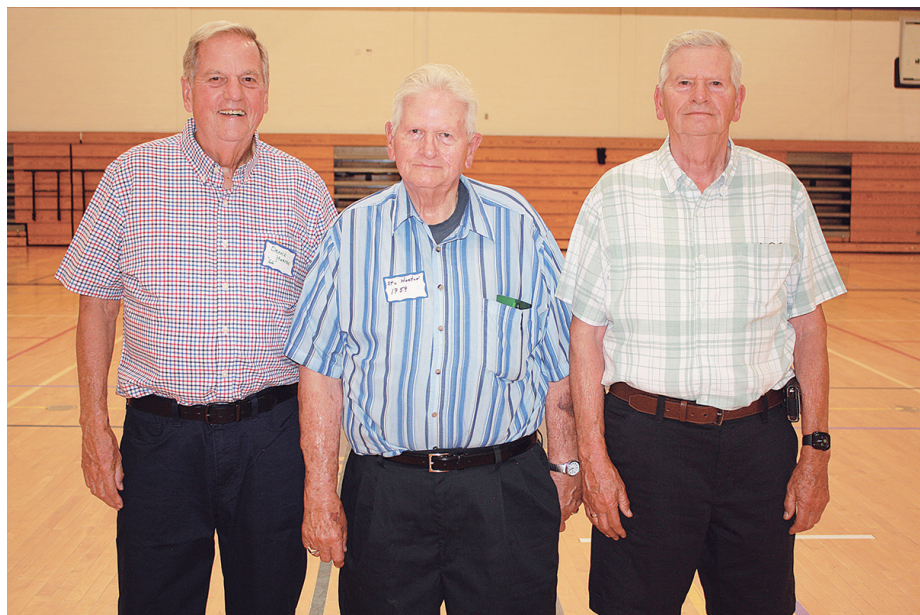

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Sawdust Memories

Ah, the arrival of hot sticky summer days and evenings is one of those changes in Michigan seasons that awaken more memories from my childhood. Dad arrived home from work promptly at 5:15 pm and the five of us sat down to supper no later than 5:30. There was no central air conditioning in the house, mom moved a floor fan from room to room to help cool her daily tasks. On extremely hot days we often ate our evening meal in the breezeway which afforded some relief from heat. After eating, most nights you'd find my dad out in the garage working on some "project". That was his workspace for power tools and more importantly, an escape from any stresses that built up during his work day as the chief building inspector for the City of Saginaw.

With the garage door open, table saw or other smaller power tool humming along, his quiet constant whistle accompanied whatever buzzing sound came from his variety of woodworking tools. The openness of the garage allowed him to see any of numerous kids riding by on bikes, others out for a walk around the block, neighbors mowing lawns. Sometimes one of the youngsters would pop in to say hello to him, ask some silly questions and bounce along, returning to their bike or walk. On one particular evening dad's work was interrupted by a pair of young men out canvassing for their church. The question they posed to my dad was "do you think God has 'anything' to do with what's going on in the world?"

Dad was quick on his feet, always. Whether a person needed some spontaneous wit or a word of encouragement, he was your man. Therefore, there was no long hesitation to give these guys an answer. "Anything?", dad repeated. "Well, He has 'everything' to do with our world." I remember their awkward long pause. Apparently their cheat card didn't tell them how to respond to such a simple statement.

Maybe you've pondered the same query that "anything" and "everything" pose to us regarding God's role in the world. This conversation my dad had took place in the 60s and by then I was finishing my junior high school years, old enough to see for myself all the changes taking place in our nation such as:

- 1964 Civil Rights Act Passed
- 1964 Beatles Arrive on the Scene
- 1968 Martin Luther King Assassinated
- 1969 Moon Landing & Woodstock Festival make headlines
- Viet Nam War Rages

From my own viewpoint, every daily headline in the *Saginaw News* was of great significance. Indeed, the '60s brought about a lot of change, yet nothing then or now came as a surprise to God. Not once has He ever wrung His hands and whispered "well, I didn't see that coming".

Paul writes in Colossians 1: 16 "For in Him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through Him and for Him. He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together." Who is Paul writing about here? That person is Jesus Christ.

Whether we are contemplating nature, other countries, kings and presidents, other people groups, Jesus is part of it all. Those things we see and cannot see, He's in it. Those rulers and presidents you dislike? He's over them, too. And though circumstances might look very chaotic? He's actually holding them together. I take great comfort in that fact as I have given too much energy scratching my head or wringing my hands with deep worry regarding current events in our country.

I need to remember the soft comforting sound of my dad's whistle as he putzed in the garage. Working with his hands gave him an outlet to express his artistic side while relieving stress. Anytime I smell clean sawdust, I can see him cutting boards, sweeping the garage floor before closing the door and retiring for the evening. By the '60s, dad had lived and served through World War II and later the Korean Conflict. His government had sent him around the world facing some horrible times before peace came and he returned home safely. It'd be years before he shared some of his experiences that could have ended his life.

Yes, a pleasant soft whistle. Hot summer evenings. Open air flowing through the garage. An occasional visitor to

interrupt his time, always welcomed with a warm smile and kind truthful answers to life's serious questions. Because life can be hard, but with God in it all, everything is good and running according to plan.

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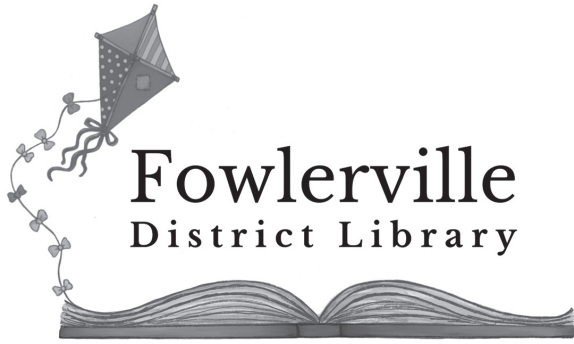
